

Energy in the Eastern Mediterranean: An explosive gas find?

February 2011, London

As part of its energy talk series, Access for Women in Energy (AccessWIE) organised a roundtable dinner discussion on Energy in the Eastern Mediterranean. The event, chaired by Dr Carole Nakhle, was hosted by Clifford Chance on 10 February 2011 in London.

The discussion focused on the oil and gas potential of the region and the main challenges faced in order to develop and export gas. Political unrest is widely acknowledged as the main setback in developing the region further.

Here are some interesting discussion points:

- Israel depends on the Egyptian gas pipeline for 40 per cent of its gas. The Leviathan field that could turn Israel into a gas exporter will not come on stream for nearly a decade.
- Iran and its local proxies are claiming that this field development will rob Lebanon of two thirds of its gas potential.

- Turkey is protesting that an Israel exploration and possible pipeline deal with Israel and southern Cyprus cuts the Turkish north of Cyprus out of the deal.
- A gas find off Gaza is not being developed for political reasons.
- The Suez Canal only handles 5 per cent of the world's energy and therefore any disruption would have minimal effect on energy markets.
- Piracy off the Horn of Africa is a more likely threat to energy security than disruption to the Suez Canal.
- Domestic Lebanese politics has delayed upstream exploration licences on and offshore.
- Arab political unrest will deter upstream energy companies. Chinese companies are less risk averse and may become involved.
- Each Arab state has its own set of circumstances making a domino effect unlikely following events in Tunisia and Egypt.
